No Fear Freshman Year



The recruiting chase for Paschal Chukwu is officially over. Providence, Boston College, Georgetown, North Carolina State, Maryland and St. Joseph's were among all the members of his fan club. After narrowing his decision down to St. Joseph's and Providence, Chukwu decided that he will bring his talents to Providence next year in 2014, where he will become a Friar and play for head coach Ed Cooley. He will bring to Providence quite an impressive resume as he averaged 13.7 points, 12.1 rebounds and 6.8 blocks per game last season while taking the Jesuits to the Class LL state title game against Hillhouse High School and to the SCC championship game. On ESPN.com he is rated as the 58th best player in the nation and the fifth best center.

Over this past summer, Chukwu was on the AAU circuit with the Connecticut Basketball Club and his improvement on the offensive end has been noticeable. Standing at 7'2, as one would imagine, his major strength on the court is shot blocking and he also rebounds the ball very well. Chukwu's main focus however is to become more of an offensive threat. Previewing Prep's Football Season




Ever since going 0-10 in 2009, Fairfield Prep Football has been on a steady ascent. With Tom Shea at the helm the past three years, The Jesuits have gone 14-16. Although their successes have been consistently sporadic, Prep Football is adamant their breakout season--one after which they make the playoffs--is imminent.

At mid-October of last year, all was looking promising for the squad sporting a 5-1 record, consisting of five seemingly effortless wins and one hard-fought loss to the almighty Xavier. Dissecting This Year's Disciplinary Overhaul

This year Fairfield Prep has instituted a series of harsh crackdowns on tardiness. The penalty for tardiness now includes, without exception, JUG with Mr. Brennan. This is a significant policy shift in the school's tardiness policy compared with last year's. If a student arrived a little late to class last year, teachers were able to handle it on a case-by-case basis. That option, along with the autonomy of the teachers, has been torn away. This policy, while well intentioned, seems to create more of a hassle than the one it prevented. Senior Tim Kiernan had a few words, "While I do understand the importance of arriving to class promptly, this policy has made for a very stressful school day. With a locker arbitrarily located in the basement of the school and classes scattered sporadically throughout all three buildings, it makes it nearly impossible to make trips to and from my locker in between class periods. Since I can't find time to visit my locker, I constantly find myself missing papers and forgetting books. Normally, I pride myself on my organizational skills. However, with this policy in place I feel like I don't even have a chance to get organized." While this may sound like the whining of a lazy senior, Tim Kiernan presents a fair point; does this extreme tardiness policy actually hinder more than it helps? In my opinion, yes, this is a wasteful practice. Students end up missing far more time by being forced to go to Mr. Brennan's office thus creating a wasteful and inefficient policy.

This well-intentioned policy is simply not worth the hassle that it creates not only for the teachers and students, but also for Mr. Brennan. On the first day of classes, upwards of sixty students were sent to JUG and the next day upwards of fifty still. With so many students in JUG, the shock factor is taken away. No longer is it a "big deal" to have JUG. If a student has JUG with twenty of his friends, where is the punishment? Receiving a JUG should not be considered the norm; it

should be the farthest thing from it, and with this dubious policy, JUG is being just what it should not be, the norm. An important group of people to consider in this situation is the teachers. That is because teachers used to have the benefit of the doubt when students were late; yes, they could send them to Mr. Brennan and, yes, they could deal with it on their own. The autonomy was something enjoyed by both teachers and students. If a student was rarely late and simply dropped something in the hall causing a slight tardiness, teachers would generally let them into class. This option is gone. A mandatory minimum policy on tardiness destroys the autonomy of a classroom. Each teacher has earned and deserves an immense amount of respect from the students and administration. While tardiness is disrespectful towards our teachers, the efficacy of this policy needs some evaluating.

Teachers, students, and the administration have all been affected negatively by this tardiness policy. Whether it be the disrespect shown to our teachers, the valuable class time missed by our students, or the incredible amount of students forced to go to JUG for minor offenses; we need a change. It is time for change, it is time for the administration to admit its mistake, and it is time for the school to take the appropriate step forward: eradicate these unnecessary and detrimental policy changes.

Return of the Rave

Every Labor Day weekend for the past five years, a music festival called “Electric Zoo” has dawned upon Randall’s Island in New York City for three days full of dancing, sun and supposed fun. At this year’s festival, sadly, two young adults died in the immediate few hours following the closing of this festival at night. These tragic deaths were both immediately attributed to the popular music festival drug, MDMA, Molly or Ecstasy. One of the deaths was a young college girl, barely 20 years of age. She left the festival Saturday night when paramedics raced her to a hospital, her last words being, “I took six hits of Molly.” Her abuse of the drug does not make her death any less of a tragedy, but it made the festival organizers think and led to the cancellation of the last day of the festival on Sunday.

Electric Zoo is a festival dedicated to the rising Electronic Dance Music scene, popularly referred to as EDM. Living in Fairfield County, a quick train ride from New York City, many local youngsters see Electric Zoo is the quintessential EDM event. It is popular among teens as young as fifteen to adults up to forty years old. There was an eighteen and older age minimum this year, but it is questionable how much that was enforced. All across the country EDM is on the rise as is drug abuse, specifically pure form Ecstasy a.k.a. Molly. There is no question the EDM musicians know that ramped drug use (with) a pure form of ecstasy comes with their music and they take advantage of this. Songs consistently have voices in the back saying “I can’t find Molly” or “Who knows my girl Molly.” With the huge rise in EDM a rise in teenage drug abuse is right behind.

Popular among Fairfield Prep students are mixers and Fairfield University concerts. Fairfield University recently hosted the EDM musician Diplo, a very popular leader of the EDM movement. No news of foul play from this concert was
